## SERIES THEME: "GOOD NEWS FROM THE BEGINNING: THE GOSPEL IN GENESIS"

TITLE: "The Good News of a Savior Who Covers Our Sin"

AS WE GATHER: The season of the Church Year that starts with Ash Wednesday is known by differing terms in various nations. The official term that dates back to the sixth century AD is Quadragesima, from the Latin word for "fortieth." This term is carried forward in Latinbased languages such as Spanish (cuaresma) and Italian (Quaresima). Central Europeans reflect the self-denial aspect of the Lenten time using the term Fastenzeit (fasting time) in Germany and Nagy-bost (great fast) in Hungary. That naming tradition is also kept in Arabic-speaking countries, where the term Sawm al-Kabir (big fast) is used. Northern Europeans and related countries refer to the season of the year, relating back to the old Anglo-Saxon word Lengten-tide (springtime), which described when the days lengthened light-wise. Although the terms for the forty days of Lent may differ, the spiritual importance of "the forty" remains constant and powerful. May keeping this time of penance and prayer with "sincerity and truth" (1 Corinthians 5:8) lead us to observe a blessed and holy Lent!

## **ADDRESS**

P Dear brothers and sisters of our Lord Jesus Christ, on this day the church begins a holy season of prayerful and penitential reflection. Our attention is especially directed to the holy sufferings and death of our Lord Jesus Christ. From ancient times the season of Lent has been kept as a time of special devotion, self-denial, and humble repentance born of a faithful heart that dwells confidently on His Word and draws from it life and hope.

Let us pray that our dear Father in heaven, for the sake of His beloved Son and in the power of His Holy Spirit, might richly bless this Lententide for us so that we may come to Easter with glad hearts and keep the feast in sincerity and truth.

## + IMPOSITION OF ASHES +

On Ash Wednesday, many congregations practice the imposition of ashes. But why? The imposition of ashes can be a powerful, tactile reminder of both Law and Gospel in which worshipers of any age can take part. Many times, the words "dust you are, and to dust you shall return" are spoken as ashes are received on the forehead. These words remind us that as a result of sin and the fall, death is a reality.

Ashes also call to mind the practice in Scripture of wearing sackcloth and ashes as a sign of sorrow and repentance of sin. Typically, however, the ashes are marked in the shape of the cross, pointing us to the promise of forgiveness of sin through Jesus' crucifixion for us. After leaving worship, we will each eventually wash off the ashen cross. As we splash water on our foreheads, we remember our Baptism, where we were cleansed of sin through water and the Word. Whether literally marked with ashes or not, we all enter this penitential season of Lent praying that God Almighty would have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins, and bring us to everlasting life.

(Worshipers who desire to receive ashes come forward at this time and stand before the pastor. The pastor applies the ashes in the shape of the cross to the forehead or hand while saying to each person, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.")

## CONFESSION

- P Let us humbly go to God, confessing our sins.
  - Almighty, eternal, loving Father,

## **OLD TESTAMENT READING**

Genesis 3:1-13, 21 (ESV)

<sup>1</sup> Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that the Lord God had made.

## **HYMN INTRODUCTION**

The season of Lent as a time of prayer, fasting, and repentance has a long history in the Christian Church. All the way back in the year AD 325, a document from the Council of Nicaea set forth a forty-day period leading up to Holy Week and Easter as a time of special devotion. The hymn "O Lord, throughout These Forty Days" recalls the time Jesus went without food in the wilderness prior to His temptation by Satan. Through the words of the hymn, we pray that our observance of a holy Lent would reflect the sacrificial love and determination of our Savior as He carried out God's gracious plan of salvation for us.
